


Breonna Hawkins Being in the Odyssey classroom has truly means—from completing homework after working hours at a job to showing up to class even when you're tired. In my



Diamond Clay Honestly, I know I have had a bit of a rough start to Odyssey, not because of the staff, the class, or the work, but because. . life just keeps on




Erica Cocoa Gentry Being in this class has enabled me to write more and encouraged me to think about what I'm




not afraid anymore to talk in front of peers and teachers.



learn a lot from each one of my classmates.






now. For instance, my motivation, participation, and experiences make me want to continue with my odyssey.
