
JONATHON ADEYANJU



experience and program to be a part of. Thank you.




YAEL JIMENEZ GONZALEZ

that will last forever.



ODYSSEY'S FOUR PROGRAMS

ODYSSEY COURSE Each year since 2003, 30 adults facing financial barriers embark on a transformational two-semester journey empowering them to overcome adversity and achieve dreams through higher education. All students receive free tuition, textbooks, materials, childcare, and dinner and are registered as UW-Madison special students. Through lively discussions of literature, philosophy, history, theatre, music, and art in a classroom in South Madison, Odyssey students not only gain six UW credits in English Literature but also acquire skills in writing, reading, and critical thinking, a stronger voice, and greater confidence in themselves and their futures.





ONWARD ODYSSEY If Odyssey helps to light a spark within students, Onward Odyssey feeds this flame through programming and wraparound services for its over 500 alumni. Odyssey supports its graduates through advising, tutoring, targeted courses, and financial resources as they pursue college degrees and other dreams. Onward Odyssey offers a supportive learning community that leverages the strong relationships that Odyssey Project alumni have with each other and with faculty and staff as they continue their education. Graduates of Odyssey have gone from homelessness to bachelor's and master's degrees; Onward Odyssey supports alumni both academically and personally throughout the journey.

ODYSSEY JUNIOR Through a weekly literacy and arts enrichment program for 50+ children and grandchildren of Odyssey students, Odyssey Junior gets the next generation excited about learning and more hopeful about their futures. While their parents are in class, 50 children and grandchildren of Odyssey students participate in an enrichment program designed to develop their interest and confidence in self-discovery and expression through the arts, reading, writing, and speaking. Odyssey takes a multigenerational approach to learning, encouraging families to view all its members as "college bound" with gifts to unwrap.





ODYSSEY BEYOND BARS Odyssey Beyond Bars teaches life-changing credit-bearing and noncredit UW-Madison courses to students incarcerated in Wisconsin prisons. Students in prison improve their academic and communication skills, gain greater confidence and empathy, and receive academic and financial advising designed to help them succeed when they re-enter their communities. Like the community-based Odyssey courses, Odyssey Beyond Bars courses provide a newfound sense of hope and an on-ramp to higher education for adult learners. As Victor Hugo observed, "He who opens a school door closes a prison."

ODYSSEY PROJECT AND ONWARD ODYSSEY







MEMORIAL AND HONORARY STUDENT PRIZES

LISA MUNRO TWO-GENERATION SCHOLARSHIP

To honor career counselor and social justice activist Lisa Munro, former UW-Madison Dean of Students Mary K. Rouse proposed a two-generation Odyssey scholarship in Lisa's name. Mary Rouse also helped fund the scholarship along with some of Lisa's relatives and friends. Lisa's husband, Dick Goldberg, recently endowed this scholarship to ensure it can be offered to future generations. Awards go to an Odyssey alum and his or her child or grandchild.

The 2022 winner is Hezouwe Walada. When Hezouwe was growing up in rural Togo, West Africa, he craved learning so much that he walked 30 miles daily without shoes, his feet bleeding, to attend the closest village school. Hezouwe brought that persistence with him when he emigrated to America, completed the Odyssey Project and Badger Ready, and went on to become a pre-med student at UW-Madison. Hezouwe is close to completing his bachelor's degree in Biochemistry from UW-Madison whil juggling work and family. This award will help Hezouwe with his studies and fund educational activities for his seven-year-old daughter.



WANDA AUERBACH MEMORIAL PRIZES

Wanda Auerbach (1927-2012) believed passionately that the richness of a liberal arts education should be available to all, regardless of income or background. Born poor in Appalachia without running water, she became the first in her family to attend college. After graduating as the valedictorian of Berea College, she earned advanced degrees and became a reference librarian.

A devoted wife, mother, grandmother, and greatgrandmother, Wanda Auerbach was an ardent supporter of the UW Odyssey Project. In her name, the Auerbach family established an endowment to support prizes to all graduating students each year.

Sharon Stark and husband Peter Livingston established a Sharon Stark Scholarship in honor of Brianna Livingston-Lengyel, their granddaughter. DIANE WALTON RESILIENCY AWARD

Last year, Odyssey Class of 2021 student Diane Walton inspired everyone with her battle to be a lifelong learner literally to her last breath. She joined class by Zoom from the hospital, the sound of monitors beeping as she read the part of Mama from *A Raisin in the Sun*. Too weak to hold a pen, she dictated poems over the phone to Emily Auerbach. Diane watched the graduation ceremony from her bed at Agrace Hospice Care, succumbing to cancer a week later.



Char Braxton took Diane her Odyssey certificate and graduation gifts in the hospital.

Inspired by her courage, an anonymous donor established a Diane Walton Resiliency Award. The plan was to select one 2022 student to receive a \$1,000 award. However, Odyssey leadership made the decision instead to give smaller awards to every graduating student in the Class of 2022. Several students battled homelessness, one lost her mother, a dozen suffered from COVID, one required leg surgery landing him in a wheelchair, many fought severe depression, one tended to an adult son who overdosed, two went to jail, one feared deportation, others parented gravely ill children, and many lost work, lost loved ones, lost relationships, and almost lost hope. We hope the incredibly resilient Class of 2022 will carry with them a piece of Diane Walton's indomitable spirit.
