# THE ODYSSEY PROJECT

## WHAT IS THE ODYSSEY PROJECT?

If you face economic barriers, the University of Wisconsin-Madison's Odvssev Project can provide you with a chance to start college. A team of UW-Madison faculty will lead you in lively discussions of great works of literature, American history, philosophy, art history, and music. Classes will also help you improve your skills in writing and critical thinking. The project director is Emily Auerbach, professor of English and recipient of numerous teaching, arts, and broadcasting awards. Many guest faculty and artists also join the class.

The program provides a variety of support services. You will receive individual help in writing, counseling on the process of applying to college, and guidance on financial aid.

Participants in the program are enrolled as University Special Students at UW-Madison. This status is not the same as regular undergraduate admission to the university, but it does carry many of the same benefits, such as library access, bus passes, etc. If you successfully complete the September-to-May program, you will receive six college credits.

Tuition for the program is free. Books are provided at no charge. Children and grandchildren of Odvssev Project students may participate in Odyssey Junior, our youth enrichment program for ages 2 to 18, offered at the same time as our class.

# WHO CAN APPLY FOR THE PROGRAM?


To be eligible to participate, you must:

- be at least 18 years old,possess a high school diploma or GED/HSED,
- have demonstrated financial need (income at or near the federal poverty level),
- possess the ability to read challenging books in English, and
- make a commitment to attend classes regularly and complete weekly assignments.

Applications will be reviewed individually to determine if a potential student's needs match the program's goals. If you are considered for the program, you will be invited to attend an interview. You are encouraged to apply as soon as possible. Enrollment is limited to approximately 30 students each academic year.
